



Here in K-Country, we are even more blessed. The spectacular surroundings only add to the superb show of colours: from the grand expanse of mountain ranges soaring into orange dawn skies, to exquisite azure blue lakes reflecting the pure yellows of the aspen forest.

Even the animals seem to conspire to put on a show. Sightings abound of fall-fat bears getting ready to hibernate, dining voraciously on plump berries and nutrient-rich roots. Moose, deer and elk bulk up on lush grasses and grow their winter coats, while soaking up the last warm days of summer – often at the roadside for our enjoyment.

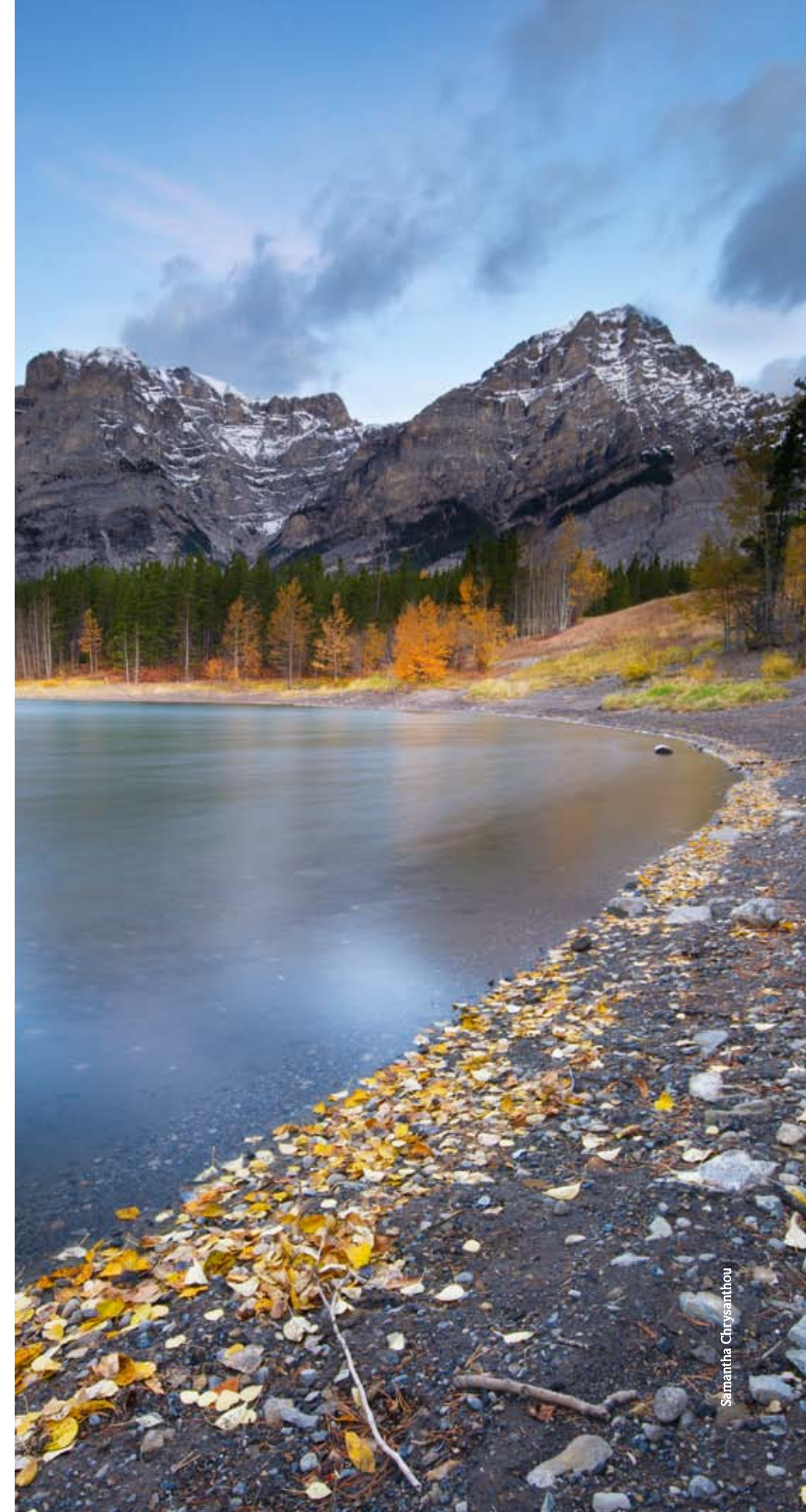
